Career & Technical Education

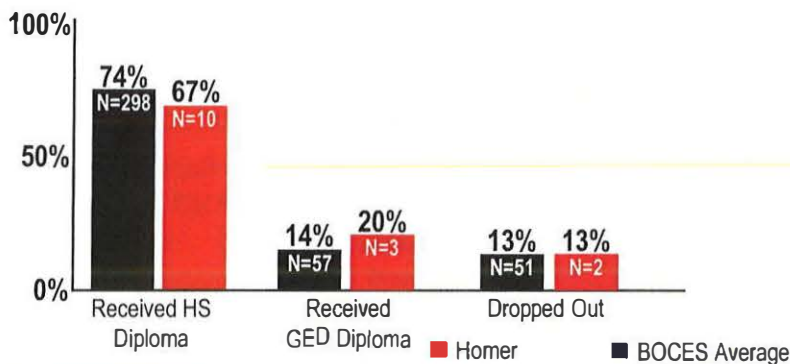


Earning a CTE Endorsement is a complex process, requiring a student to meet industry standards and possess the necessary entry level technical skills. In New York State, students who wish to earn a CTE Endorsement must meet rigorous requirements, including passing nationally recognized tests in their field of study. The tests taken by OCM BOCES students are developed by national organizations.

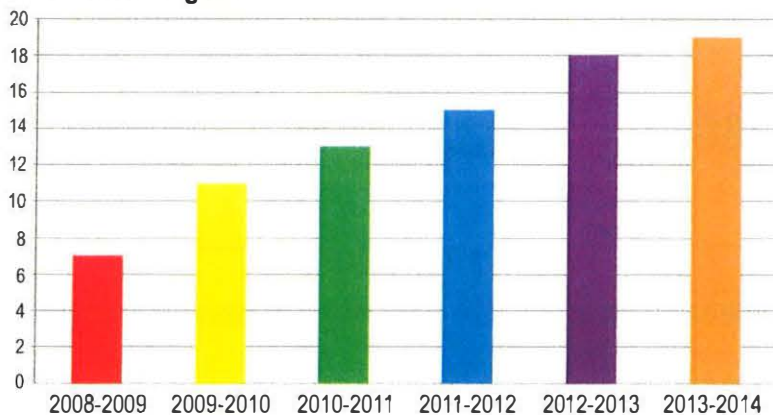
Combined 2005 through 2009 Cohort Data for Homer Students Attending OCM BOCES Alternative Education Programs

In the four years that Jake Stanley has been at the OCM BOCES Cortland Alternative School (CAS), he hasn't missed a single day of school. But before making the move to CAS, Jake wasn't so dedicated to his school work. He said that he found it difficult to be a part of a big school and was excited to come to CAS and learn in what he calls a "comfortable learning environment." Jake's favorite memory of CAS was taking a trip to New York City during his freshman year, when he realized that he had already made a lot of friends and found connections with "the most amazing teachers" he met at CAS. While Jake is still deciding how he is going to shape his future,

he has a passion for technology and is well on his way to a successful career. He is ahead in his school work at CAS, which allows him to take several online college courses during the school day. Jake says that he chooses to spend additional time at school every day, even when he is through with his required work, because he "likes it here a lot" and has discovered that he is a more positive person because of CAS.

Instructional Support Services Did You Know?

The teachers at Homer Intermediate School have been working hard to implement the use of curriculum modules written by Expeditionary Learning. As they do this, they continue to think critically between the use of complex text and instructional level text to build a staircase of complexity. Part of this work has been to meet as grade level teams to take a deeper look into the role of central text within the modules and the use of a guided reading approach to support literacy development across the content areas. Next steps for teachers will be daily time spent honing the skills needed to better select and use texts, capitalize on opportunities for students to think across texts and build deep understandings of concepts and ideas.

Instructional Technology Services at the CNYRIC

The Instructional Technology & Design program at the CNYRIC offers a vast array of technology integration services for districts. Our Model Schools program offers over 100 professional development opportunities for teachers and administrators each year, from on-line PD courses and webinars, to face-to-face workshops. In addition, the Technology and Leadership Keynote Series (TALKS) brings in engaging speakers to talk about technology leadership in education. A variety of E-Learning and video conferencing services are available to connect classrooms to content providers, virtual field trips, and other classrooms across the globe. Our mediaCONNECT service provides 120,000 pieces of digital and physical media to enhance classroom instruction from providers like Discovery Education and NBC Archives on Demand.

Data Warehouse

The CNYRIC Data Warehouse team guides districts in developing sustainable practices for the skillful use of data to meet state requirements and improve student outcomes. Through job-embedded professional development and leadership, CNYRIC District Data Coordinators (DDCs) work closely with district personnel to provide support in the areas of data verification and reporting; balanced assessment systems; integrated data systems; and data analysis and facilitation. The CNYRIC DDCs are skilled administrators who meet the diversified needs of districts. Some examples of the support they provide to Homer to build capacity in data verification and analysis are as follows: provide expertise and assistance in New York State reporting and accountability; work with staff to resolve Data Warehouse reporting errors and establish processes to maintain data accuracy; and teach staff to utilize tools, including AIMSweb, STAR, the National Student Clearinghouse, and COGNOS and triangulate data to inform instructional planning and differentiate instruction.

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
